You can expect to find, linens, textiles, furniture, art, glass, silver, wooden ware, rugs, primitives, ironstone, vintage holiday, architectural and garden items, yellow ware, pottery, china, early lighting, folk-art, jewelry, antique dolls, culinary, early carpentry tools, and more.

SHARE will be selling hot dogs, popcorn and drinks and AAUW will be selling vegetarian chili.

Assisting with the set up and breakdown on the common will be Souhegan High School students who volunteer their time as part of their community service requirements.

The Chapel and the Wigwam, museums run by the Historical Society of Amherst, will be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Admission is \$5. Tickets can be picked up at Moulton's and at the library. With a ticket, admission is \$4 at the gate. If you become a new member of the Historical Society that day, you will receive complimentary tickets to the Antiques on

the Green and help the society reach its membership goal of 500 new members by October 31 to qualify for a \$25,000 award from the Robert and Karin Finlay Foundation.

The proceeds from this event funds a scholarship given each year to a graduating senior interested in history.

from the sale of the books allows the Friends to make a significant contribution to the library each year, there are additional advantages to donating books. They provide the library with replacements for worn-out books, keep good reading material in circulation inexpensively, and provide free reading for members of charitable organizations.

The Friends in the past have been able to give thousands of dollars for such projects as shelving, refurbishing of the children's room, a circulation desk counter, shelves and books for a Parent Resource Center, children's books, a DVD collection, talking books, and an LCD. On-going projects that make use of the proceeds include free museum passes, financial support for adult and children's programs, and holiday decorations.

Volunteers are needed for the book sale. Although inmates of the Hillsborough County House of Correction will be doing the lifting of the boxes of books on Thursday afternoon, September 11, volunteers with trucks and vans will be needed to transport the books and oversee the process of getting them

into place in the church. On Friday, volunteers will move the books from the large storage boxes to the smaller display boxes and help with organizing the children's books. Jobs needing to be filled on Saturday include cashing, bagging, and helping to keep the books in order. Anyone interested in volunteering on any of these days should call Nancy Head, 673-1389 or sign up at the library.

Hardcovers sell for \$1.00 and paperbacks for \$.50. Children's books range from \$.10 for board books to \$.50 for hardcover books. Special adult and children's books as well as unique "oddsies" are priced slightly higher. At the end of the sale, teachers in the Amherst schools and charitable organizations will be given the opportunity to take books free of charge. Any remaining books are given to a company which recycles them for charitable purpose.

A special thanks to Vick and Nancy Bennisson who make it possible for the Friends to organize a book sale of such high quality.

- Continue to learn so that you rise above the crowd. Gower stresses education - not necessarily college, but whatever learning tools you need to achieve your goals. Things you learn on the job will help you grow. Gower also emphasizes it is your duty to perform your assigned work to the best of your abilities; you will earn benefits now and in the future.
- Evaluate each financial decision based on the cost and by what means you will cover it. Part of that cost may be stress, not just money. Think before you leap! Rather than using "plastic money" keep your financial commitments within your ability to pay.
- When you plan for retirement, examine your health, your prospects for longer life, and what resources you will need to enjoy it. If you are happy in your work, and it is not creating a health problem, why not continue to work? And if you do retire make plans to fill the 40 extra hours a week you will have available. You cannot just take to the rocking chair!
- Part of living is being useful. Get involved in community services. Volunteer with your church or a non-profit worthy of support. Add these accomplishments and achievements which make your life that much more meaningful.
- Conduct your life with honesty, integrity, grace, love, humility, forgiveness, fairness and thankfulness for your blessings. Regardless what form your beliefs take; you must have respect for yourself and others.

As Gower tells us, "Use every day as a stop on the road to success and happiness. We all learn from adversity, so cherish today, and you will succeed on life's various battlefields."
