

the daytime mid week coverage. ing these hours to the on-call staff for the first three months to utilize our own on-call staff before looking outside of the department to fill the shifts. The Ways and Means are reported to have said that any additional coverage found by using this method would be an improvement over what we currently have.

The selectmen stated that they have been wrestling with the idea of a possible merger between Fire department and EMS for a while. At this time, they believe it makes more sense to concentrate on a study to appoint a focus group to determine if the merger will help to fill in the hours, before the town spends or asks for additional funds.

In addition to coverage, the response time of the department to an alarm was reviewed.

In January at the BOS meeting They recommended paying/offer- Fire Chief Mark Boynton said that the initial response should be four minutes (one truck with four fire fighters on it) and nine minutes for a full complement of fire fighters (fifteen firefighters) on scene. At this time, our response times are at twelve minutes, plus with one or two people. The Mutual Aid would be in addition to those times. Additionally, depending upon the area in town where the Mutual Aid is called the response times can be from twelve minutes to an example of twenty-six minutes to a recent propane leak in town.

Fire Chief Boynton said that fortunately we have not had any major calls where we were unable to respond. The one incident that we did have was the recent propane leak on Amherst Street where it took twenty-six minutes to get Mutual Aid on


