It's About Conservation

Matt Kowalsky asks Dr. Ryan Stone what she likes best about floating miles above the earth. Stone replies, "The quiet".

Does a day go by when you don't wish for quiet - reprieve from the noises of traffic, kids, motorized things, the radio? We can't join Stone in space; however, we can distance ourselves for moments from the invasive noises assaulting our ears. The sounds from the neighbors, highways, and the world are hard to duck. Solitude and quietude are hard-to-find commodities as much as we need some every day.

The paths kept by the Conservation Commission and other others lead to places out of sight of the noise generators, if not totally beyond their hearing. There are places in town where even the sound of Route 101 truck tires is diminished. Here's a sampler of places we choose:

• The Reflecting Place over Beaver Brook behind the Congregational Church.

Along the Hammond Brook Trail in Joe English Reservation where the music of falling water negates the man-made intrusions.

• Also in JER are the benches set along Joe English Brook and ponds for resting the body with

the ears. Other benches you may choose to find are beside the Souhegan River off Fairway Drive, on the B&M Trail, and on the Bragdon Farm north

A bench on the long bridge over the beaver pond in Pond Parish Town Forest is a special place. • My premiere escape route is the Grater Woods Trail, passing under century-old pines to reach the bluff where bird calls (and an occasional Southwest bird) prevail.

Someone visiting the country for the first time asked, "What's that strange sound?" The host answered, "It's called Quiet". Find your own place of quiet. Books, pads, and pencils (non-electronic) are acceptable companions. Nature has been bountiful to Amherst. Take your feet and join her for an hour of quiet(er) refreshment and re-cre-
