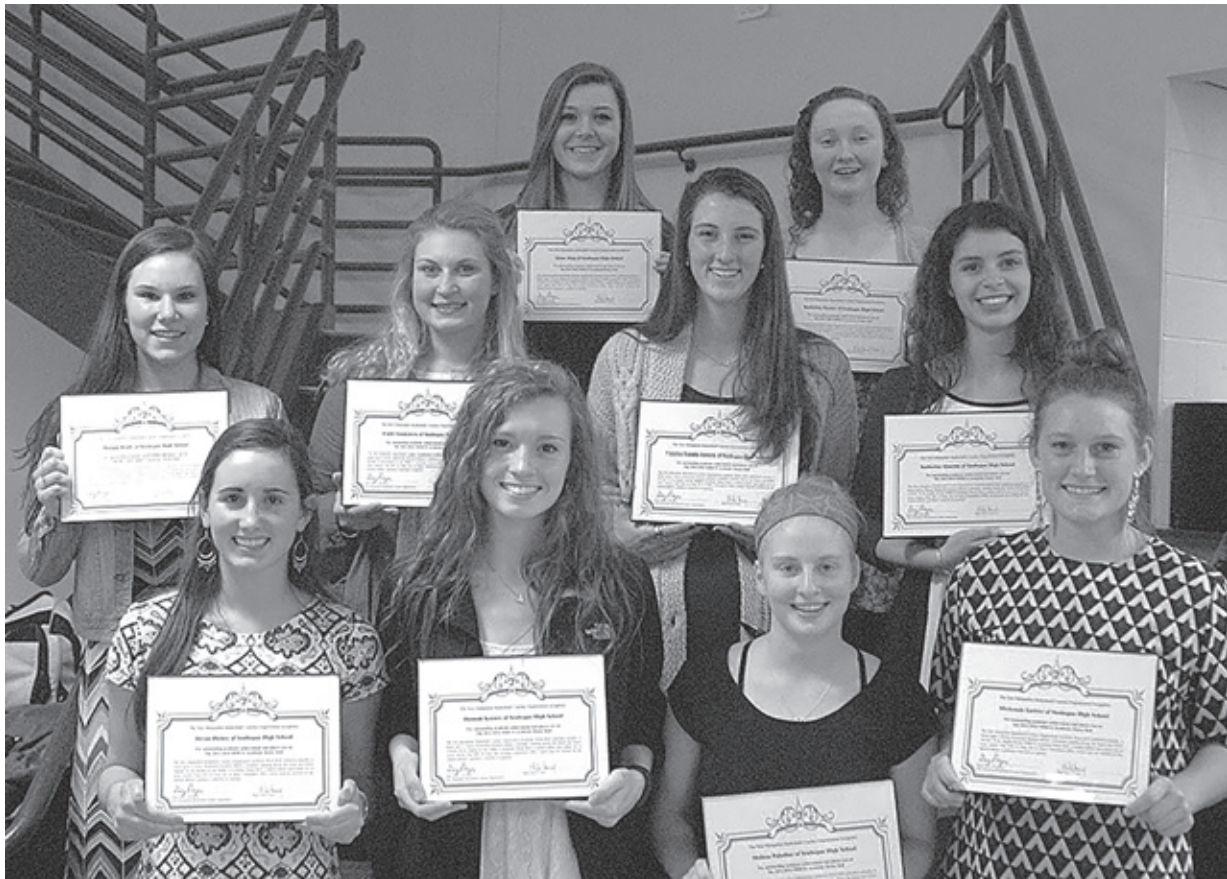

Museum to be OPEN on Gala Day from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Under the direction of Mont Vernon Historical Society Museum Curator Sandy Kent, volunteers spent last summer and this spring working hard to reorganize the museum's collection. Sandy is delighted to announce the museum will be open on Gala Day from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. (closed during parade), and then be open during the summer months on dates and times to be announced in the near future.

While being closed last season, the following volunteers worked to get the museum ready to be re-opened: Dan Bellemore, David Brooks, Eloise Carleton, Jill Weber, Jim Whipple, Laurie Brown, Megan Brown, Mike Fimbel, Mike Warren, and his father, George Warren, Peter Ecklund, Roxanne O'Brien, Sally Hogan, and Shirley Levesque.

The museum located on the second floor of the Town Hall first opened its doors in 1990. Its exhibits include the window and a bank of mail boxes from the post office that was once located behind the general store, Lamson Farm and Grand Hotel memorabilia, two quite rare

antique Nutter clocks, a row of EIGHT David Dutton clocks, and a quilt made by the King's Daughters' organization that includes a square that is over 150 years old. There is also a small library in the museum and a selection of historical society books, note cards, puzzles, and T-shirts for sale in the museum's store. There is no charge to visit the museum.

Members of the historical society are reminded dues are due. Annual dues are \$10; lifetime dues are \$100. Interested in joining? New members are always welcome. Book Discussion Program

The next book in the book discussion series will be Ann Hood's "The Obituary Writer" on Monday, June 2, at 9:30 a.m., at the library. The book published in 2013 goes back and forth in time between two women. Claire is enchanted with Jackie Kennedy during the time of her husband's 1963 inauguration, and Vivien, an obituary writer in 1919, has not stopped searching for her lover who disappeared in the 1906 San Francisco Earthquake. A mystery and love story, themes include expectations of marriage and love, the roles of wives and mothers, and the emotions of grief, regret, and hope.

The group usually meets once a month and the meetings last an hour and a half to two hours. Participants take turns bringing a light refreshment. No attendance requirement – attend discussions that are of interest. The library purchases a copy of each selection that may be checked out by library patrons when the book is not reserved for the discussion. Multiple copies of the book are made available through inter-library loan. The program is suitable for adults and open to Mont Vernon residents at no charge. For bookkeeping purposes, non-residents wanting to borrow a book will need to join the library,

Need some ideas on how can you start a new garden or improve an existing one? The Friends of the Daland Memorial Library will host an evening focusing on establishing and maintaining gardens on Wednesday, June 4, at 7 p.m. at the library. Friend of the Library member Dorothy Ledner has arranged for a panel of four to do short presentations on their expertise allowing for ample time for questions. Master Gardener, Kelly Merryfield, Amherst Garden Club member, Lois Boericke, and new-to-town resident Heather Wilson whose focus is growing healthy crops in chemical-free dirt will be on the panel. Recent addition will be either, Lyn Lombard or Hannah Proctor. Their expertise is invasive plant species. Handouts will be available.

The members of the panel have varied backgrounds which means a wide variety of questions may be answered. Kelly Merryfield owns a business called Merryfield Design, which does garden design, planting, and maintenance for homes and businesses. For many years she worked at her family's nursery in Massachusetts. Lois Boericke became interested in growing fresh food in the 1970s and from there developed an interest in flowers. She's learned valuable lessons from many mistakes. Her lovely home gardens have benefited from trial and error. At Cornell University she took a shortened version of the Master's Gardeners' Course and hopes to take the full length course in the near future. Heather Wilson has successfully completed a course in holistic management. She is currently managing a vegetable garden and a flock of chickens. In the fall, she heads to Lesley College where she will follow her passions for quality food and working with children.

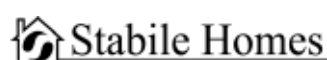
