A Tale of the County Gaol in Amherst continued from page 4

Jonathan & Molly had already spent a winter in the county gaol at Amherst, which must have been miserable. Another prisoner, one Joseph Kelly, in his petition written to the governor and house of representatives in Jan. 1774, begging for clemency, complained that he suffered greatly from lack of fire, candle and daylight. With the prospect of another winter, whether by sentencing or from lack of means to pay the court fees and fines, it's no wonder Jonathan & Molly broke out of the jail – and happily he did not leave her behind.

The Prisoner's Family in Mason

Jonathan Fish (born 1738 in Groton, Mass.) was 34 years old when he was caught in adultery with Miss Foster. He had moved to Mason in 1752 with his parents, Nathan & Patience Fish, and seven siblings, and the family, among the earliest settlers of Mason, quickly built a small dwelling house and cleared 5 acres. Before his imprisonment, Jonathan was a yeoman (farmer) of Mason, where five children had been born to his wife Dorothy, the eldest being Jonathan Jr. in Sep. 1762 and the youngest, Asa, in Sep. 1772. Would Jonathan Sr. have deserted his wife, if he hadn't been hauled into prison and court for adultery? We can't

know from this distance. But one consequence is known. At the April 1779 Town Meeting of Mason, one of the warrant articles was: "To put out Asa Fish, by vendue [public auction], to the lowest bidder, till he is 21 years of age." With his father Jonathan AWOL (he disappears from the genealogical radar after his jail break in 1774), six-year-old Asa became a charity case, a town pauper, a year before his mother Mrs. Dorothy Fish died. (History of Mason, 1858.) That same year, in Sep. 1779, Jonathan Fish of Mason (Jr. aged 17) joined the 5th Regiment of N.H. Militia (of Col. Moses Nichols of Amherst) and was sent to Portsmouth under Capt. Hezekiah Lovejoy of Amherst. What became of Jonathan Sr. & his paramour is unknown, but at least two of his legitimate sons moved to other states, and had offspring and descendants.

Adventures of Another Adulterer in Amherst's Gaol

Several decades later, at the beginning of the 19th century, another man was imprisoned at Amherst for adultery. Before he had even reached his majority, Seth Wyman Jr. (1784-1843) of Goffstown had taken up with a young married woman named Mrs. Chandler. Their affair angered the community, proba-

When news came that her husband had taken out a warrant against him and her brother was threatening to kill him if he should attempt to visit her again, Wyman fled the state, walking to Nashua and from there catching a stagecoach to Boston. His father succeeded in buying off the husband with cash, because she was pregnant with her lover's child. But Wyman had another nemesis, the local tavern-keeper, named Aaron Cilley. Wyman was an inveterate thief and burglar and shoplifter but clever at hiding his loot, so despite repeated searches when goods went missing and stores were broken into, no one could catch him at it. One day he visited the tavern just to provoke Cilley and saw an opportunity to pocket his watch. As expected, Cilley appeared in the middle of the night with a search warrant and large search party. As Wyman tells it in his 1843 memoir: "They were finally obliged to give up the search, but, determined not to have come for nothing, they took me for the crime of adultery. The next day I was brought before a justice, and committed by him for trial at the next court, under heavy bonds for my appearance. For want of bail, I was obliged to go to jail, and at last I saw the inside of Amherst Jail, where I

years. I was put in one of the criminal cells with four criminals; two of whom were in for passing counterfeit money, the third – a negro – for illicit connexion with a white woman, and the fourth for setting the others at liberty." The next day, the tavern-keeper went to the house of Mrs. C.'s father, where she had gone after her paramour had been taken away, and Cilley took her prisoner at his house (the inn) until the next day when her friends "succeeded in settling with him on the conditions that they should pay him a certain sum in return for his trouble, and that Mrs. C. would leave town." Meanwhile his case came up for trial at Hopkinton, but Wyman was not indicted by the Grand Jury because Cilley had neglected to bring a certificate of marriage, so Wyman was released. Cilley was angry, so Wyman and Mrs. Chandler, living as man and wife without yet benefit of marriage, had to look over their shoulders to avoid being taken. She was divorced and eventually they married and had several more chil dren. Wyman's life of crime led to another stay in Amherst's jail, from which he escaped; and also to imprisonment in other jails, during which time his family lived in the almshouse.
