## Congregational Church Youth Travel to Tennessee for Service Project

Five vans. Four travel days. Eighteen hundred miles. One night at a very sketchy hotel. Six nights sleeping on a church floor. Four showers, all outside

Five families. Five homes. Five days of hard, hard work. Five days that changed lives.

On Saturday, June 21st, a group of 27 teens from the Senior High Youth Fellowship and ten adults packed up rental vans and began a two-day journey down to the northeastern corner of Tennessee to work with the Appalachia Service Project. ASP is an organization that serves impoverished families by helping to make their homes livable and safe.

On Monday, the group split into five work teams and with tools in hand drove to the work sites to meet the families that they would be helping. In five days of work under the hot Tennessee sun the Amherst group went through gallons of water, dirtied a pile of T-shirts and jeans, and learned that wearing safety goggles and dust masks is not only fashionable, but necessary. In five days, teens who had never held a hammer before discovered that they had the skills to reinforce a foundation, install siding, build a deck, mud and tape drywall, and replace a

The teens also learned a lot about gratitude. As one of the teens said on the final night, "We aren't down here fixing houses because of the thank yous and warm hugs we get in return. We are here to serve others, because it is the right thing to do and the loving thing to do, and we do it regardless of what we expect to receive in return."

Back in Amherst, the group shared their experiences with the church congregation and expressed gratitude for the church support that helped make the trip possible.



Five days. Five families. Five homes repaired. And countless memories and lessons learned to carry the young people forward.


