

Searching for Souhegan Alumni in the Military





Computer Science Career Exploration Program

Three Souhegan HS juniors are participating in a pilot program to explore career options in computer science. Alexa Beck, Ryan Hanks and Jeffrey Johansen are enrolled in Computer Science Career Exploration, a pilot program initiated, supervised and currently taught by Dr. Ali Rafieymehr, Director of Workforce Development & STEM at DYN and former Dean at UNH-Manchester. The program is a reflection of both Dr. Rafieymehr's and DYN's commitment to preparing area students for STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) careers and keeping those young professionals in New Hamp-

Rafieymeyer approached area high schools last May with a description of his pilot program and asked for their help in identifying prospective participants. Matt Toy, Amherst resident and VP of Customer Service at DYN, has worked with Souhegan Counselor Tim Cotreau and Community Service Coordinator Maggie Paul on Souhegan's Business Partner Advisory Board, and suggested that Souhegan take part. Cotreau, Paul and counselor Dina Karlon began speaking with students who were interested in computer science careers. Math teacher and Math Team coach Lee Gast and computer technology teacher John Ranta also referred students to the counselors, and interested students as well as their parents learned more about the program's goals and expectations. A core group went on to meet individually with Dr. Rafieymehr. Acceptance to the CSCE

program was based on that interview, in addition to an essay about each student's own expectations for the program. Both Ryan Hanks and Jeff Johansen were excited by early entry into a career track in computer science. Johansen had participated in programming competitions, Hanks had worked on programming with the SHS FIRST Robotics team. Beck had more experience in computer hardware but wished to expand into creating software pro-

Eleven students, including Beck, Hanks and Johansen, from 7 area high schools (Campbell HS, Manchester West HS, Manchester Memorial High School, Manchester School of Technology, Merrimack HS, Pembroke Academy and Souhegan HS) were selected and began their CSCE activities this fall. They meet for three hours each Tuesday afternoon in the Technology & Innovation Academy at SEE in Man-

The CSCE program will encompass 4 semesters of study during the participants' junior and senior years, for which students will receive high school academic credit as well as college credit through

Manchester Community College. The courses will be rigorous; students will complete projects, assignments and exams and be gradwhile maintaining their high school course load. All participants re-shuffled afterschool, sports or other activities when they committed to the program.

Dr. Rafieymehr has selected the areas of study for the 4 semesters: #1 and current semester, C++ (a programming language), #2 JAVA other programming language #3 Entrepreneurship (idea to product) and #4 Internship (working at SEE lab on projects for companies). The courses will be taught by business professionals because an important goal of the program is creating for the students the experience of working on a technology team. The eleven students work alongside each other each Tuesday, report out as group, snack and even celebrate birthdays. Beck said that although much of their work is completed outside their Tuesday sessions, the students do already share a certain esprit de corps.

Current students participate in Computer Science Careers Exploration at no cost. CSCE instructors are not paid, DYN provided a grant, SEE provides space without charge, and Manchester Community College absorbed some tuition costs. Dr. Rafieymehr continues to fundraise for CSCE and fully expects to welcome its second class next September, as this first class enters their second year of the program.

SHS Makes Staff Introductions

AMHERST - Souhegan High School welcomed five new staff members in September. All positions were the result of the retirement of individuals last year and the reshaping of some of those positions to meet current instruction-

Former SAU 39 Superintendent Richard Lalley was the first contact new School Counselor Catherine Ledoux had with Souhegan. Dr. Lalley was her professor in a Philosophy of Education course and he shared the story of Souhegan's start up with the class. Kate went on to work in a variety of settings including a community health center, adolescent substance abuse treatment program, residential group home and public high school, but never forgot Dr Lalley's enthusiastic description of Souhegan. Opportunity came last spring in a job posting for a school counselor at SHS. Kate's "passion is working with teens in a high school setting" and thus far she is impressed with the positive energy of SHS students and staff and the school's culture which promotes the success of every stu-Souhegan's commitment to the

success of every student also impresses Matthew Guarente, new wellness teacher. Matt is a native of Saugus MA and a recent graduate of University of New Hampshire with a masters degree in physical education and health. He looks forward to putting into practice with Souhegan students the experiences and skills he gained as a student teacher, substitute teacher, coach, camp director and accomplished collegiate track athlete.

Robert "Jake" Landry is a Souhegan alumnus who received his degree in anthropology and sociology with an emphasis on educational inequality from Connecticut Col-

lege. After a year as an Americorps volunteer at the Boys and Girls Club of Woburn MA, he comes to Souhegan as a special education paraprofessional. Jake notes that his new position is the "fulfillment of a dream to work at his old high school." Some changes are evident, but he is happy with the opportunity to contribute to what he observes to be "a consistently marvelous group of faculty and students."

Holleigh Tlapa came to Souhegan with a wealth of experience. In her own words she is "Mother to my six children, an advocate for famistances thru the Foundation that I run in memory of my daughter, a survivor to those enduring loss and hardship, a storyteller to the fans of my newspaper column, and an enabler of learning to every child I meet." More specifically, the job at Souhegan has tapped into her Master's Degree in Business Education and professional background in IT sales and marketing. Holleigh has discovered a "wonderful mix of students" through her classes in Marketing, Web Design and Personal Finance and she describes Souhegan staff and students as "friendly and welcoming ... hungry for knowledge and filled with spirit." Veronica Gallant, new Adminis-

trative Assistant to the Dean of Students in the Student Services office, came to Souhegan after working for 13 years in the SAU 87 school district. She started there as a parent volunteer, worked as a paraprofessional and shifted to more administrative tasks in the special education offices. Her professional move brings her closer to her home in Amherst.

Lily Batchelder's Visual Arts submission won an Award of Merit at the National level. Only 5 students receive this award at each age level in each art division, so it is quite an honor!
