

Pipeline Authority to Selectmen – Sidewalks for the Village

AMHERST - At the town deliberative meeting the Board of Selectmen made an effort to zero out article 29 which requested taxpayers to raise \$62,620 to fund residential sidewalks. The article was being removed because it was contingent on \$262,480 (80% reimbursement from the government) coming from a federal grant program entitled Federal Transportation Alternative Program. When the grant was not awarded to Amherst, the selectmen with advise from legal counsel deleted the wording leaving the article as \$0.00.

The article as originally written would have constructed sidewalks along portions of Jones Rd., Mack Hill Rd., Manchester Rd., New Boston Rd., and Boston Post Rd for a total of 5,215

From the floor of the deliberative, George Bower amended the amended article, to add back into the wording the full amount of \$328,100 for sidewalks with the taxpayer fully funding the project.

George Bower explained, "The town needs this project even without federal funding. Mr. Bower said that as a runner who uses these roads, he knows that safety is an issue. "More sidewalks to run on safely and for walking to school are needed."

Rick Katzenberg supported the amendment because the village is heavily walked and the town needs the village sidewalk project.

The amended sidewalk article will add \$0.21 to the tax rate. The town tax rate will go up by 11%. The Ways and Means had no comment because they did not have enough time for consid-

Other articles considered and not amended were: FY 16 operating budget \$12,427,814 (increase of \$617,383). Default budget is \$12,064,726.

Bridge Replacement Bond \$3,324,108. This article places two

Amherst bridges (Mont Vernon Road bridge and Thornton Ferry Road I) on the State list for repairs. The voter must pass the bond in order to qualify for 80% reimbursement from the

Contingency Fund - \$100,000 to come from undesignated fund balance. No tax impact in FY16 because it was raised through taxation in FY15.

No changes to Capital Reserve Funds: \$15,000 Assessing Revaluation; \$15,000 Communications Center; \$55,000 Fire Station Renovation to come from LUCT funds; \$150,000 Fire Truck Refurbish.

Public Health Mosquito Program was amended down to \$36,000 from \$40,000.

Article 32 does not have a tax impact. It grants the Board of Selectmen to act as Pipeline Intervener Status. "in order to present the claims of Amherst residents and property owners and protect their rights.
