Anatomy of A Hero

Update on Drew D'Auteuil's bone marrow transplant and his meeting with the donor.

We arrived last Friday to Germany. Having been in touch with Steven prior to leaving, we planned to meet him and his family on Saturday. The trip was a whirlwind of emotions including meeting Steven, seeing family, traveling to Holland and the news we received right before we left that we were getting a puppy!

But, back to Steven. For over 5 1/2 years, I have wondered about that moment of meeting Drew's lifesaving donor. We have been in regular contact for the last 3 years but meeting face to face? Trust me when I say, you cannot even imagine it. How do you define a hero? The Oxford dictionary defines a hero as "A person, typically a man, who is admired or idealized for courage, outstanding achievements or noble qualities." Greek folklore often described heroes as daring with strong personalities and inhuman strength and abilities. Heroes can also be described as people who influenced change for the better in the course of our history. How do I define a hero? That's easy because we met ours.

In the fall of 2009, about a year after Steven joined the registry, he received a call that he was

a match for a young boy. At approximately the same time, we were learning that Drew had a match who was ready, willing and able to give his bone marrow to save his life. At that time, our palpable anxiety was reduced somewhat, knowing that there was someone out there who would give to save Drew's life. Learning that neither vin nor Ryan was a match for rew was one of the most heartbreaking parts of Drew's illness. So we focused on the future and Drew's recovery. The days leading up to Drew's transplant were scary, but full of hope for a future. We learned shortly before the transplant that Drew's team of doctors were thinking his donor was from Europe. We knew only that it was a young man. The doctors thought this because on some of the medical reports there was test results for mad cow disease, something that a citizen of the US wouldn't have been tested for unless he/she spent some time in Europe. I remember that Drew found that quite humorous at the time. When

November 18th finally arrived, Drew's transplant took place at 9 pm that evening, complete with Drew pushing the start button. I have to be hon-

est...despite the hope and joy we felt that we were beginning on the journey to reclaim Drew's health and the anticipation following a week of chemo and radiation, the whole transplant was a boring as a regular old IV infusion. That was ok with us but with everything leading up to it, you'd almost have expected fireworks or something. Nope. Just an infusion. Then the waiting game began.

Over the next 2 years, Drew struggled quite a bit, but recovered miraculously from that unexpected complication and time crept slowly by. I remember writing in one of his journal updates about how time was moving so slow for us, but it seemed that we were feeling time speed by for everyone After 1 year, we else. were allowed to write to Drew's donor as long as we didn't put anything identifying in the letter including references to our location, Drew's ill-

ness, etc. We learned that his donor was willing to correspond and we were thrilled. As we approached the 2nd year mark, we were contacted again for the donation center and asked if we wanted to exchange contact information with Drew's donor. On March 24th, 2012, we were able to call Steven on the phone and we've kept in touch ever since. 2010 but that was too soon for us to have been able to connect. They took us over to the castle ruins just a 3 min drive from his house and then hosted a barbeque for us where we met Steven's parents Sonja and Bob and Kathrin's parents Peter and Gita and her brother Kevin. Steven's father is actually from Jacksonville but moved to Germany after he was out of the army.

Everyone was so welcoming and I can't say enough about the food. German food is something else! I connected immediately with Steven's mother Sonja and it was with her at the end of the evening that we both broke down. I just wanted to express to her how much Steven meant to us. He gave Drew a gift that cannot be paid for, measured or be thanked for completely. She's also a mom and can probably relate. Steven's generosity, kindness and compassion were obviously fostered by his parents and for that, I'm extremely grateful to them. As we said our goodbyes, we reminded them that they always had a place to stay should they return to the US and we hope to make another trip that could include Kevin and Rvan

So, how to I define a hero? The young man who saved my son's life. He traveled over 250 km from his home to donate his marrow. He answered that phone call and agreed to the commitment, time and yes, the discomfort. He could have said no. He could have said he didn't have time or that he had changed his mind (unfortunately, this does happen too often for potential bone marrow donors). He didn't. He agreed to save a little boy that he didn't even know. He kept my family whole and gave my son a second chance at a full life.

The origin of the word hero is Greek and the literal translation is "protector" or "defender." A hero doesn't have to wear a red cape or fly faster than a speeding bullet. He doesn't have to have superhuman strength or abilities beyond our imagination. He doesn't have to inspire change, but he did change the course of history for us. Over the years, the definition of hero has fluctubeen redefined for a certain time peri ated and od or situation, but the underlying qualities that remain timeless should dictate to whom the title should fall upon. In our case, a giving heart, a generous nature and compassion were all the qualities we needed and Steven possessed. He made a choice that day in November, 2009. He made a choice to make a difference and in doing so, saved Drew's life. A little boy. A little boy who is now a honor student in his sophomore year, participating in school sports, applying for jobs, received his confirmation and earned his driver's license. All of this because of Steven's gift. That's how I define a hero.


