Rain Washes E. Coli Into Rivers

Rain on Monday after two weeks of dry weather washed E. coli bacteria into local rivers according to tests performed on the Merrimack and Souhegan Rivers on Tuesday morning. However, there has been no rain since then, so it is expected that the E. coli levels have dropped to more acceptable levels – probably OK for swimming now according to the testing program.

The eleven sites tested on the Merrimack between Manchester and Tyngsborough had good results with one exception: the boat access at Greeley Park spiked up to 727. Results higher than 88 are not acceptable for swimming according to the test. The rest of the Merrimack tested well below the 88 limit. The next highest number was at Depot Street in Merrimack at only 56.9.

The Souhegan River, as a smaller river, is more affected by rainfall. The upper stretch of the river, from New Ipswich to Wilton, tested at reasonable levels, less than 88; the lower section, from Wilton to Merrimack, jumped to a 400 level, approaching a dangerous level in some spots for swimming. Some of the usual swimming spots like the Boston Post Road Canoeport in Amherst, Indian Ledges and Turkey Hill Bridge in Merrimack were slightly higher than acceptable, in the 110-150 range. Watson Park in Merrimack, however, tested at an acceptable 49.6.

The testing program also tests for dissolved oxygen levels in both rivers. This gives a better indication of the actual health of the river. At this time of year, the DO levels are expected to be good. The tests found they are actually excellent, some of the best levels ever seen in the Souhegan. The dams on the Merrimack reduce the DO levels, but the tests showed still very good results.

An even better indicator of the health of the river is an inventory of the various insects that live in the river. Recent surveys of the Souhegan River in Milford found many bugs that can survive only in pollution-free water. The chemical analysis is important but macroinvertibrate analysis is the gold standard for determining the health of the

The Souhegan River is monitored in its entire length which stretches from Ashburnham, MA, to Merrimack, NH, over 35 miles. Typically the Souhegan has low E. coli levels and excellent dissolved oxygen levels in the upper half of the river to West Milford. From here to the mouth of the river in Merrimack, the river meanders back and forth over sandy soil, slows down, and the E. coli levels increase – usually only to still acceptable levels. Dissolved oxygen levels also drop but still to very acceptable levels.

Several of the sites that should be monitored were not monitored this week for lack of volunteers. SWA welcomes anyone interested in helping out by adopting a site and collecting data once every two weeks. Museum to be OPEN Saturday, July 11

Check out the tea thrown overboard in Boston Harbor in 1773

The Mont Vernon Historical Society Museum will be open on Saturday, July 11 from 1-4 p.m. The museum is located on the second floor of the Town Hall on Main Street. It opened twenty-five years ago in 1990. The historical society museums in Amherst and Milford will be open at the same time. All three museums will again be open the second Saturday August through October.

This year exhibits of note include the "Key to Mont Vernon" presented to returning WWI veteran Harold A Trow. Nine residents of Mont Vernon served in WWI. There will also be a display of old photos and newsletters from the Mont Vernon Village School, and a display of dresses worn by women in the mid-1900s. Ladies' hats from this period are on display as well. In addition, this year a small portion of the actual tea thrown overboard during the 1773 Boston Tea Party will be on display. The story of how it came to the museum will be on hand.

Other exhibits of interest include the window and a bank of mail boxes from the post office that was once located behind the general store, Lamson Farm and Grand Hotel memorabilia, two quite rare antique Nutter clocks, a row of eight David Dutton clocks, and a quilt made by the King's Daughters' organization that includes a square that is over 150 years old. There is also a small library in the museum and a selection of historical society books, note cards, and T-shirts for sale in the museum's store. There is no charge to visit the museum.
